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Pattern Introduction

A quick and easy knit for gift giving! Fill this simply constructed pyramid box with candies, jewelry, and the like. A crocheted slip stitch edges the box and chains create the button holes. Top the pyramid with a profusion of leftover bits of yarn to add to the celebration! The recipient will delight in the “wrapping” just as much as the gift.

Pyramid Gift Box

designed by Jennifer Edwards
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Gauge 4 ½ sts = 1” in stockinette.

What you need

Small amount of worsted or aran weight yarn.
 Tiny bits of leftover yarns, ribbons, raffia for embellishment.
 Size 6 needles (or size needed to obtain gauge) I used double pointed needles.
 Size G or H crochet hook (depending on weight of yarn used for edging)
 2 or 3 ¼ - ½” buttons
 Yarn Needle

Stitches you need to know

Stockinette Stitch: Knit a row, Purl a row

Garter Stitch: Knit every row

For crochet edge & button loops:

Slip Stitch

Chain Stitch

Gauge is not of great importance. I like the resulting knitted material to be fairly stiff for the box to stand and not be too floppy. Adjust your needle size to gain a firm, but not too tight, fabric.

Measurements Small box = approx. 2 $\frac{3}{4}$ " tall and 2 $\frac{3}{4}$ " wide. (without top embellishment)
Larger box = approx. 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ " tall and 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ " wide. (without top embellishment)

Abbreviations you need to know

Beg = beginning
Ch = chain
Lp = loop
Sl st = slip stitch

Sp = space
St st = stockinette stitch
Rem = remaining
Rep = repeat

Memory Refreshers

1. "Fasten off" means to draw your yarn through the last loop you have on your needle or hook, then cut or break the yarn 3-4 inches away from loop. Now draw the yarn out of the securing loop you made. Give the end on your work a tug for good measure.

Tips & Tricks

1. When a pattern tells you to Cast On without telling you which cast-on to use...what do you do? Here are some tips: When you are not told which cast on to use, it is fairly safe to use whichever one you know. Long-tail, e-wrap, and the knitted cast-on are basic cast-on methods that can be used broadly. E-wrap (or thumb wrap) can be very elastic, so for some patterns, including this one, e-wrap might not be the best option. If you know, and prefer, some of the other cast-on methods (crochet cast-on being one of my favorites) then by all means use it.

2. When working a slip stitch into knitted stitches, it can be difficult to know WHERE to place your hook. The bind-off edge will be easy because these stitches look like the tops of crochet stitches. However, the "row ends" of knitting and the cast-on edge is a bit different (unless you used crochet cast-on). Just use your judgment as to which loops of yarn you work into. **This is not an exact science!** The key to having a uniform look to your crochet trimwork, is to be **consistent** with WHEREVER you choose to put your hook.

Walkthrough

*Leaving a 10" or longer tail, cast on 15 sts for small box, 20 sts for larger box. Use either knitted cast-on, long-tail, or crochet cast-on. (See Tips & Tricks #1)

The 10" tail will be used to assemble box later.

Rows 1-2: Purl.

Rows 3 and following: Beginning with a knit row, work in St St until work measures 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ " for small box, 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ " for larger box.

**To obtain a more precise length (and thus a better looking pyramid), measure the width of your work and multiply that times 2. Then subtract $\frac{1}{2}$ " to allow for the remaining purl rows.

Final 2 Rows: Purl.

Bind off in Purl. Leave a 2 ft. long tail.

Assemble Box:

*Refer to Diagram 1 at right for how to seam the box together.

*Using yarn needle and 10" beginning tail end, seam with piece folded in half from A to B. Fasten off, weave in end.

*Then fold the piece, according to Diagram 2, and using 2 ft. long tail end, seam together back & forth from C to D. **Do not** fasten off!

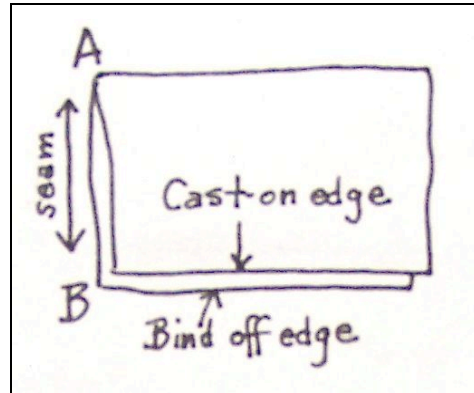

Edge Box and Button Loops:

*Using Crochet Hook and remainder of long tail end, work sl sts down one side of opening. Then on other side, stop every 4-5 sts and ch 5 to form button loop!

*Continue by placing hook into same st where chains came out, and work 4-5 sl sts to the next ch-5 button loop.

*Work last step again if making the Larger Box.

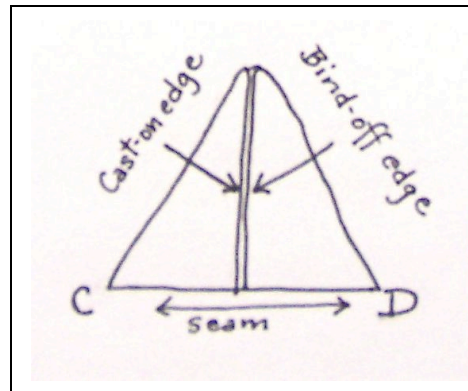

Then continue sl sts up to the top of box. **Do not** fasten off!

Sewing on Buttons:

*Continuing with this same long tail end and yarn needle, weave yarn through edge of opening to where the button loop you created on the other side corresponds. Sew button.

*Continue weaving yarn through to next button loop space and sew button.

*When you've finished sewing on all the buttons, fasten off and weave in end.

Topper Embellishment:

*Using crochet hook and 4-5" bits of colorful yarns, ribbons, and/or raffia, pull bits through the top of pyramid box and tie. Continue doing this in different places to create a profusion of color. Trim to desired look.

Variations on a Theme

*These would be cute striped! or knitted with variegated yarns!

*Work other stitch patterns:

just garter stitch, basketweave stitch, seed stitch...anything! Just remember to measure the width of your work, then double it for the length, subtracting $\frac{1}{2}$ " for the last two purl rows and binding off.
